


Food Insecurity in the United States, 2001 to April 2020

Philanthropy must go beyond charity to fund transformational food system change

*Commit to organizations in a spirit of **slow philanthropy** with the understanding that food system transformation is a **long-term commitment** to social change.*

*Commit to projects and policy that **shorten food bank lines** through emphasizing the **realization of the right to food**, income security and investing in community wealth building projects.*

*Commit to **grassroots organizations** working to address the root causes of food system inequity, especially projects led by people from **BIPOC communities**, that abide by democratic decision making, and that prioritize **agroecology and climate justice**, and the equitable redistribution of wealth.*

*Commit to **strengthening networks** that contribute to the **resilience of regional food systems**, and those that build power from the bottom up to reshape food policies that **serve people over profit**.*

*Commit to funding organizations that involve **experts-by-experience in decision making** and governance structures.*
